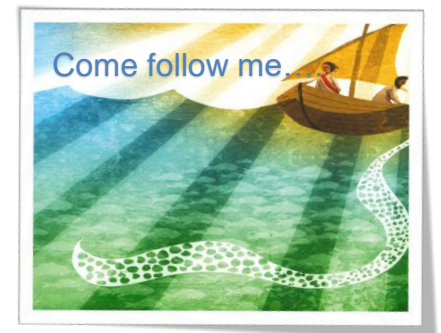
Dear Parents,

Year 6 Quarry Bank Mill

On Thursday this week, Year 6 were very fortunate to be able to visit Quarry Bank Mill in Wilmslow, Cheshire.



Quarry Bank is a place of stark contrast, where the power of the Industrial Revolution sits alongside the beauty of picturesque gardens and lush countryside. The children discovered facts about the industrial community and experienced the very different worlds of owner and worker, who lived and worked there, side by side, with very different lived experiences!

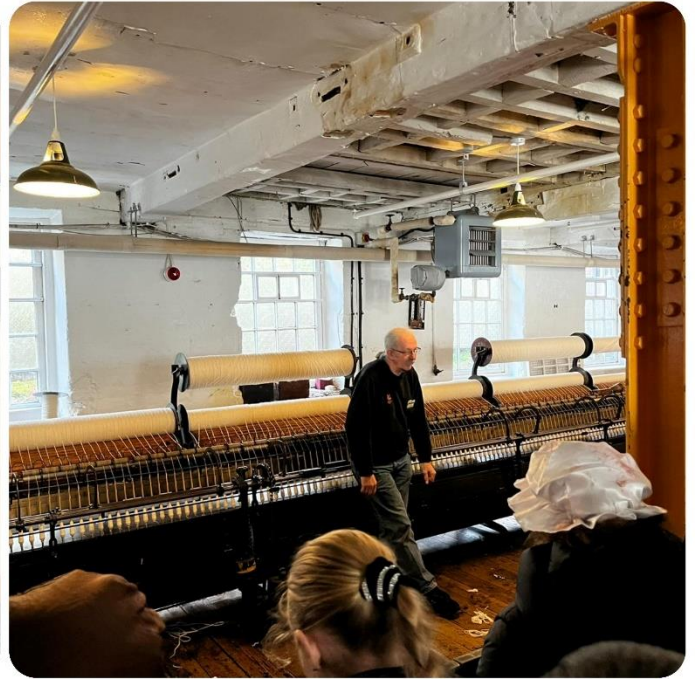
The children were tasked with passing some (rather basic – Mr Greg wanted all the workers he could get!) tests, before signing the Indenture to be enrolled as apprentices. They learnt all about the grueling daily lives of apprentices living in the Apprentice House under the supervision of Mrs Shawcross, before heading down to the Mill to experience some hard labour for themselves!





Outside of their 12 hour working days, apprentices had to take care of their living quarters: making beds, dusting, tending to the vegetable patches, and even emptying the chamber pots – sorry, boys!

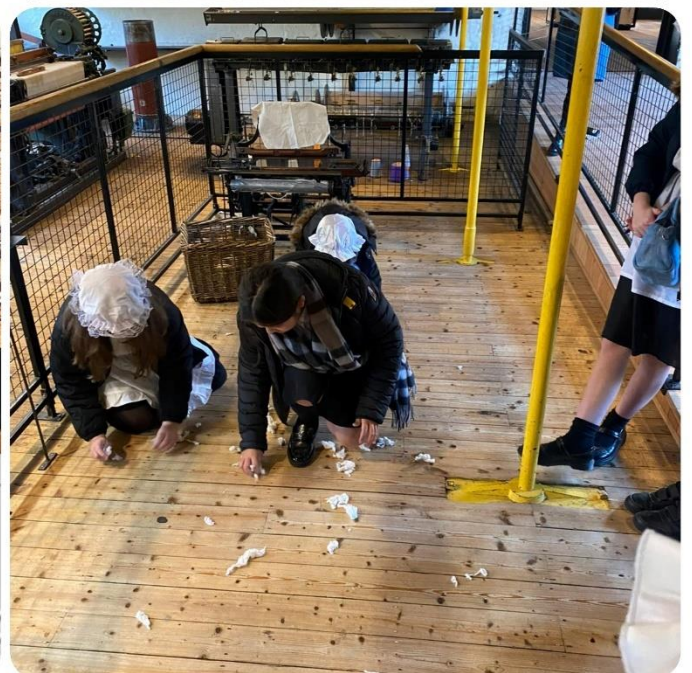
Quarry Bank Mill is a rare surviving eighteenth-century cotton mill, built by the industrialist Samuel Greg, with working heritage machinery. The children experienced what it was like to be working in the mill, where children used to work up to 12 hours a day.





The children soon realised that 'idle chit-chat' wasn't tolerated by Mr Greg: to him, 'time is money'! After being spoken through the developments in weaving, from a wheel through to the spinning Jenny and then the factory's giant machinery, Year 6 took on some of the roles of a 19th century apprentice: 'carrying the can', changing the bobbins, and scavenging.

All the children really threw themselves into their roles. Although, eating together in the workers kitchen, was not like eating lunch back at St. Gregory's!





The children all looked amazing dressed in costume for this trip. We would like to thank all our parents for their efforts in providing the outfits for the children – they were commended highly by volunteers and public for their appearance and enthusiasm. They have learnt so many extra life skills during this trip, too: parents, their bedrooms should always be tidy from now on!

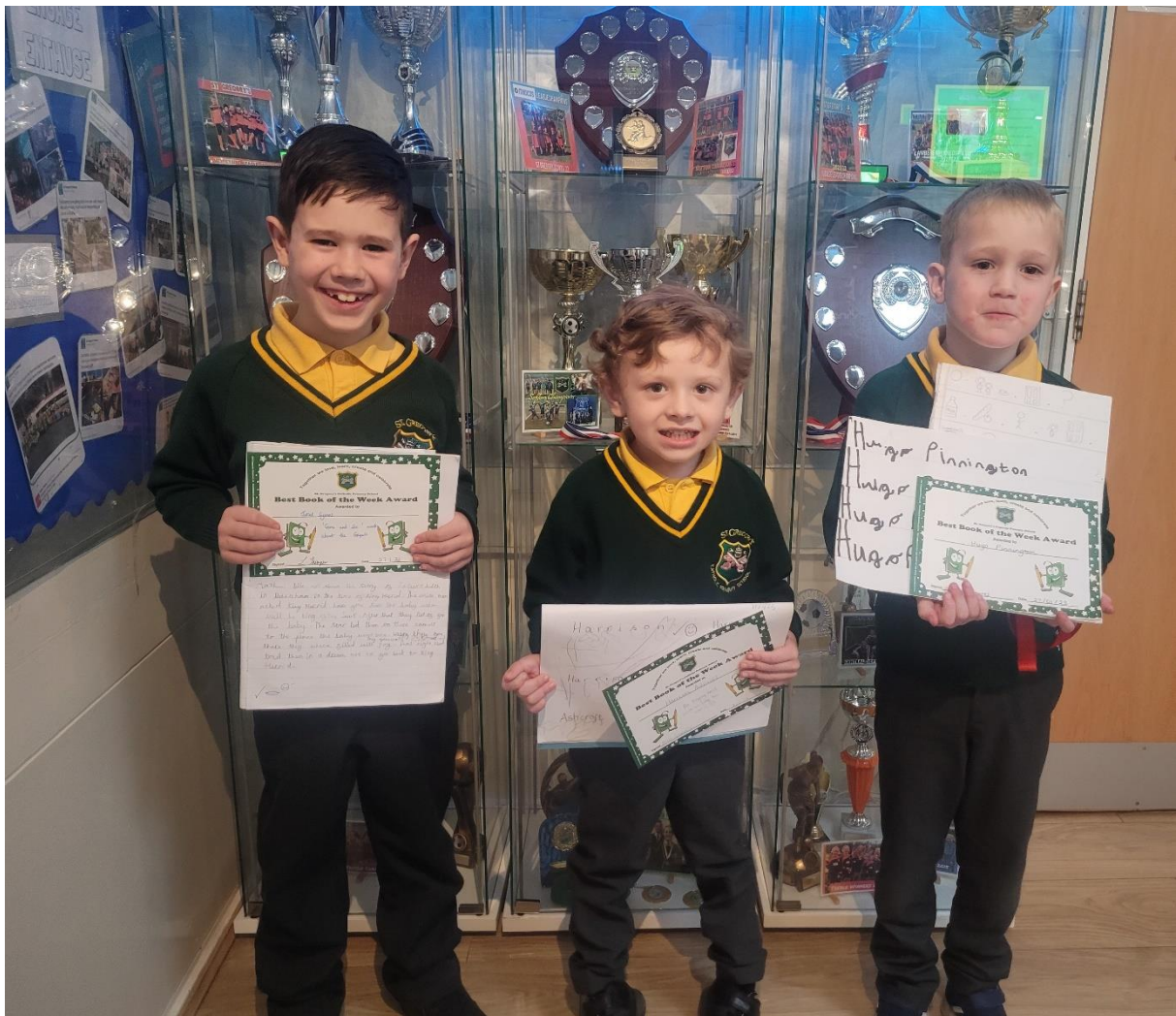
